American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowships

Beginning July 1, 1977, and continuing for at least one year, the American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research in Washington, D.C., will offer a limited number of National Endowment for the Humanities fellowships, for full-time research for a period of no less than six months and no longer than one year. Residency would be continuous and in Washington at the Institute. *Applications are now invited from interested scholars, with a deadline for receipt of April 15, 1977, addressed to Dr. Robert J. Pranger, American Enterprise Institute, 1150 17th Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20036.* Announcement of fellowship awards will be made within three months of the application deadline. As a non-profit, nonpartisan, research and educational institution, AEI is keenly interested in humanistic research applicable to public policy issues. To date, this research has been undertaken by persons connected with the Institute in the following areas:

- 1) peace studies which include regional conflict issues;
- 2) economic development and human values;
- 3) the relationship of public policy to political institutions and how certain institutions can either nurture or inhibit the promulgation of specific human values;
- 4) the future of constitutional, democratic political institutions;
- 5) technological innovation in relationship to the formulation of a national security policy that is congruent with America's historical heritage.

While the above areas are broad enough to include most concerns, applicants who are especially concerned with the frontiers between the humanities and public policy on other issues may also apply.

Support under the National Endowment for the Humanities fellowships at the American Enterprise Institute will be limited to study or research in the humanities and humanistic social sciences. These fellowships will not be awarded to degree candidates or for study leading to advanced degrees, but are limited to persons with doctorates or equivalent at both senior and junior levels in their careers. Foreign nationals may not be included unless they have been residents in the United States for at least three years immediately preceding the date of their award, with individual exceptions permit-

ted only in rare cases. Fellows must devote full time to their study and may not simultaneously hold other major fellowships except sabbaticals or grants from their own institutions. The National Endowment for the Humanities fellows at AEI will be granted all benefits, services and accommodations normally accorded other fellows at the Institute.

Effort will be made to give support to both senior and junior scholars, though full implementation of the program for junior scholars will await on receipt of matching funds. Residency at AEI may begin as early as July 1, 1977.

Inter-University Seminar on Armed Forces and Society Harold D. Lasswell Award

The Inter-University Seminar on Armed Forces and Society is pleased to announce the winners of the first biannual Harold D. Lasswell Award. The award was established to recognize the work of younger scholars in the areas of military institutions, civil-military relations, arms control and peacekeeping and the management of conflict. The winner of the first award was Robert Smith of the University of Georgia for his work, "The Effects of Military Service on Early Occupational and Educational Attainment." Those receiving honorable mention include: John Weltman of Oberlin College for his work "On Obsolescence of War," William Thompson of Florida State University for his work "Organizational Cohesion and Military Coup Outcomes," and Jorge Dominguez of Harvard University for his work "The Civic Soldier in Cuba."

**Texas Tech University Center for
Public Service Fellowship Award**

The Center for Public Service, Texas Tech University, was one of 22 in the nation to be awarded Public Service Fellowships for the first time for 1976-77, and one of 19 to be awarded an initial Public Service Education institutional grant.

These two grants were awarded under Title IX of the Higher Education Act of 1965, for \$26,016 for fellowships and \$10,400 for insti-

tutional support of its Master of Public Administration program.

Also during 1975-76 the Center administered projects supported by grants from Title I, the Higher Education Act and from the Texas State agency of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

PERSONNEL SERVICE

The American Political Science Association's Personnel Service operates as a clearinghouse, bringing together political scientists seeking positions and prospective employers. Registration in the service is open to members of the Association and to Political Science Departments. CREDENTIAL REFERRAL SERVICE

A file will be maintained at the Association office for all members of the Credential Referral Service. This file will include a resume, a dissertation abstract and/or a list of publications, and up to three letters of reference for each member. Referrals are made upon the request of a member or of an institution.

The Association's Council has adopted a policy that it is a professional obligation of all political science departments to list publicly all vacancies in the APSA Personnel Service Newsletter for which they are recruiting at the Instructor, Assistant and Associate Professor levels. Employers who are not Departmental Services Program members are charged the following for each position: \$25.00, first listing; \$15.00, second listing; \$10.00, third listing.
