A New Prize In Political Science

The Brian Barry Prize



Beginning in 2014, in partnership with Cambridge University Press and the *British Journal of Political Science (BJPoS)* the British Academy will award a prize in honour of Brian Barry, a distinguished Fellow of the Academy and founding editor of the journal.

Brian Barry was a distinguished moral and political philosopher whose work fruitfully combined analytic philosophy and political science, political theory and social choice theory. The prize will be awarded annually for excellence in political science, as displayed in an essay submitted for the prize that has not been previously published and is not under consideration for publication elsewhere. The essay can address any topic in political science, as covered by *BJPoS*, but essays in fields related to the work of Brian Barry will be especially welcome.

Essays may be submitted by anyone in possession of a first degree. Entries should be 8,000 to 10,000 words, with an abstract of no more than 100 words.

Entries may be submitted at any time, but to be eligible for the 2014 Prize must be received by 31 January 2014.

Entries should be submitted electronically to submission.barryprize@cambridge.org. They should be in accordance with the journal's style sheet available on the homepage.

The Prize will be awarded by the Events and Prizes Committee of the British Academy, on the advice of a Prize Committee especially appointed to assess entries for the Brian Barry Prize.

The Prize, valued at £2,500 will be awarded at a ceremony at the British Academy in July 2014. The winning entry will be published in the *British Journal of Political Science*, possibly after revisions.

Notes for Contributors

All manuscripts should be submitted via our online system, Editorial Manager, at: <http://bjpols.edmgr.com>

Submission of an article in the first instance is taken to imply that it has not been previously published and is not being considered for publication elsewhere. Authors of articles published in the Journal assign copyright to Cambridge University Press (with certain rights reserved) and you will receive a copyright assignment form for signature on acceptance of your paper. Authors are responsible for obtaining permission to reproduce any material in which they do not own copyright, to be used in both print and electronic media, and for ensuring that the appropriate acknowledgements are included in their manuscript.

Submissions should be anonymized, though one version may contain names for editorial use. It is the responsibility of authors to ensure that the anonymization is effective.

Authors will be required to submit any article that has been accepted for publication in a format that can be processed by the publisher. The publisher reserves the right to typeset material by conventional means.

Where statistical analysis of data has been conducted, contributors should deposit a **replication dataset** online or with a major public data archive.

Anyone who is preparing a manuscript for submission to the Journal is urged to follow the Journal's **style sheet**, which covers a number of detailed points concerning footnotes, punctuation, spelling, etc. Though initial submissions need not conform to Journal style, the final copy for publication will be expected to do so. See Style Sheet for Authors available on-line or from the Editors.

Articles submitted to the Journal should in general be between 5,000 and 12,000 words (or equivalent in tables and figures) in length. An abstract not exceeding 120 words is required.

The Journal seeks to carry **Review Articles**, which are intended to be substantial intellectual contributions in their own right. Review Articles are the same length as articles, refereed, and must be submitted via Editorial Manager. Questions about Review Articles should be submitted to the managing editor.

Notes and Comments are welcome. A Note should contain a body of original information, a new method for doing something or a new idea (speculation, argument, proof, etc.) presented in a brief and unadorned form without inessential commentary. Comments containing criticisms of articles published in the Journal and additional thoughts on them will be considered for early publication, especially if they are short – say, under 1,000 words.

First proofs may be read and corrected by contributors provided that they can give the Editors an address through which they can be reached without delay and can guarantee to return the corrected proofs, by air mail where appropriate, within ten days of receiving them. The master proof is held by the Editors; contributors will receive duplicates.
