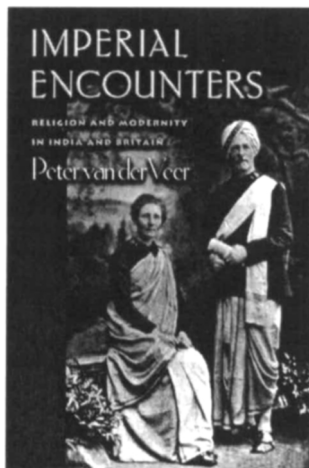

In the process, van der Veer chronicles how these notions developed in the second half of the nineteenth century in relation to gender, race, language, spirituality, and science.

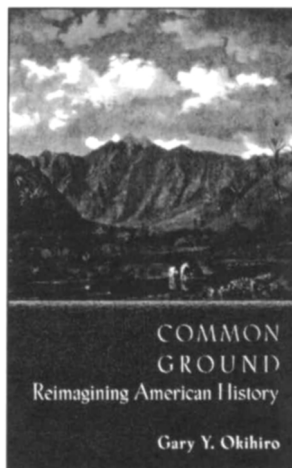

Article manuscripts, including notes, should not exceed 50 pages in length. Please submit four copies. All submitted work should be double-spaced, including extracts, notes, and references. Consult recent issues of the *Journal* as a guide to format. Footnotes should be as few as possible, and typed double-spaced at the end of the text. Documentation should follow the style recommended in sections 16.3 through 16.28 of the *Chicago Manual of Style*, 14th ed. (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 1993), pp. 641–51. Authors are encouraged to submit tables, figures, maps, photographs, and other illustrations along with their manuscripts; please consult the editor for specifications. Additional guidelines on manuscript preparation will be sent upon request.

All manuscripts submitted to the *JAS* are expected not to have been published elsewhere and not be under review for possible publication elsewhere. Unsolicited book reviews are not accepted.
