THE BOSTON AFFIRMATIONS

- It is no news that Israel faces some hard choices. Some might call it a brutal bargain, except it does not seem to be much of a bargain. Mark Bruzonsky and Israel Singer outline the fast receding limits within which Israel can hope to be around fifty years from now. All the choices are desperate, but some are less desperate than others
- Most leaders who junk the values of liberal democracy do so in the name of "the people." Indira Gandhi is no exception. In a thorough analysis of the new authoritarianism in India Stephen Oren gives reason to be skeptical about Mrs. Gandhi's concern for justice for the poor. The new regime, says Oren, is curiously compatible with the interests of the very well-to-do, who continue to turn events to their advantage.
