Comments and shorter notes are also welcome. The JOURNAL does not accept unsolicited book reviews, nor can it honor requests to review particular works. Contributions should be typed double-spaced. Footnotes, also double-spaced, should be grouped at the end of the paper, along with figures and tables. Four copies of each manuscript should be submitted. Prospective contributors may obtain a copy of the Style Sheet for the JOURNAL from the Editorial Office. A submission fee of \$20.00 or a year's membership (fee schedule below) is required from nonmembers of the Association.
