The Great Leap Forward was Mao Tse-tung's attempt to short cut the process of economic development by mobilizing China's masses to propel their country overnight into a modernized communist utopia. It resulted in economic depression, political strife, and international dissension. It was a major milestone along the road to the cultural revolution and its effects are being felt and its lessons learned even today. This second volume of Roderick MacFarquhar's history will be essential reading for scholars, journalists, and diplomats interested in China, and for political scientists and development economists. £22.50

In the third edition of *The Rise of Modern China*, the author has carefully pruned the text in order to make room for a new section on China after the death of Mao Tse-tung in 1976. Topics in this new section include the crimes of the Gang of Four, changes in Chinese agricultural policies, in the manner and cost of industrialization, the Deng Xiaoping government, the dynamics of US-Chinese relations, the Chinese invasion of Vietnam, and the changing relations between Taiwan and mainland China. Articles on China prior to 1949 are also welcome, particularly, but not exclusively, when these relate directly to contemporary China or to the history of the Chinese Communist Party. Articles should be submitted, in triplicate, to the editorial office. They should be typed in double spacing, footnotes being placed at the end of the article; preferably conform to the styling of *The China Quarterly*; and normally not exceed 8–10,000 words in length. Submission of a manuscript is taken to imply that it has not previously been published and that it is not currently being considered elsewhere.
