The famous Armenian-Russian marine artist Hovhannes Aivazyan (1817–1900), better known as Ivan Konstantinovich Aivazovsky, completed this painting, *Ice mountains in the Antarctic*, in 1870, which happened to be the fiftieth anniversary of the Russian Antarctic expedition commanded by Captain F.F. Bellingshausen. Although it has long been supposed to represent one of the ships in that squadron, Rip Bulkeley explains in this issue that there are several reasons to question that assumption.
