Women on the Afro-European Frontier



Sierra Leone, on Africa's west coast, was settled in the late eighteenth century by former slaves from Great Britain, Nova Scotia, and Jamaica. The women among them were independent in both their public and private lives. In Sierra Leone they became businesswomen, traders, persons of note within their communities. But the strengthening of British colonial rule in the late nineteenth century ended this age of independence for the women traders of Sierra Leone.

E. Frances White tells the fascinating economic and social history of these women, successful traders who once helped link regional and trading networks with international economy. Her book sheds new light on the role of women as cultural brokers across ethnic boundaries and adds a significant contribution to the debate over the impact of capitalism and colonial rule on the women of Africa.

ASA NEWS: Reports current and future activities of the Association, bibliographical and news notes, employment notices, significant correspondence and announcements of concern to the world community of Africanists.
