BRITISH MEDICAL ASSOCIATION, MANCHESTER, 1929.

Wednesday, 24th July.—10 A.M. *Discussion*: The Cerebrospinal Fluid as an aid to Diagnosis and Treatment of Inflammatory Intracranial Lesions. To be opened by Dr Wells P. Eagleton (Newark, N. J.), followed by Dr J. G. Greenfield (London) and Dr H. Cohen (Liverpool).

In the afternoon clinical cases will be shown at the Manchester Royal Infirmary.

Thursday, 25th July.—10 A.M. *Discussion*: Persistent Nasal Catarrh, especially in Children. To be opened by Mr Dan McKenzie (London), followed by Mr F. B. Gilhespy (Birmingham) and Mr Douglas Guthrie (Edinburgh).

11.30 A.M. (Joint meeting with Section of Tuberculosis.) *Discussion*: Tuberculosis of the Larynx. To be opened by Mr Walter Howarth (London), followed by Sir St Clair Thomson (London) and Mr H. Morrision Davies (Vale of Clwyd Sanatorium).

In the afternoon there will be a demonstration of instructional methods at the Royal Deaf Schools, Old Trafford, by Mr J. Spalding.

Models of the Labyrinth



These models (King's College Hospital pattern) were devised by

Mr A. H. CHEATLE

and

Mr NEGUS

for teaching purposes and for investigating labyrinthine diseases.

The pointers on the Head frame lie parallel with the Frankfort plane, so that when the frame is on the head the models lie in correct orientation in all respects. The patient's head can be put in any position and the exact relations of each of the canals are seen; rotation and caloric tests can be carried out with the frame in position.
