## THE CONTRIBUTORS

EDWARD SHILS is Professor of Sociology and Social Thought in the Committee on Social Thought at the University of Chicago.

MALCOLM W. HOAG, on leave from The RAND Corporation during the academic year 1959-1960, is serving as Professor of Foreign Affairs at the National War College.

ADAM B. ULAM is a member of the Russian Research Center and the Department of Government at Harvard University. The author of *Titoism and the Cominform* (1952), he recently completed *The Unfinished Revolution*, a study of the historical development of Marxism that will be published later this year.

WILFRED MALENBAUM is Professor of Economics in the Wharton School of Finance and Commerce at the University of Pennsylvania, where he participates in the South Asia Regional Studies program. His publications include *East and West in India's Development* (1959) and *Prospects for Indian Development*, to appear in England in the fall of 1960.

WOLFGANG STOLPER, Professor of Economics at the University of Michigan, is the author of two forthcoming studies of economic development—*Structure of the East German Economy* and *Germany Between East and West*. His present research concerns economic development of Africa south of the Sahara.

ROBERT M. STERN, Assistant Professor of Economics at Columbia University, has written a number of articles dealing with the history and current problems of world food exports and imports. He is engaged in research on the factors determining primary product prices.

CHARLES J. HITCH, head of the Economics Division of The RAND Corporation, collaborated with R. N. McKean on *The Economics of Defense in the Nuclear Age*, which will appear later this year.

J. DAVID SINGER is Visiting Assistant Professor of Political Science at the University of Michigan; after a six-month assignment at the Naval War College, he will join the Mental Health Research Institute at Michigan. Two books of his are about to be published: *Deterrence and Disarmament* and *The Behavioral Sciences and International Politics*.

C. P. KINDLEBERGER, Professor of Economics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, is a member of the editorial board of *World Politics*. His most recent book is *Economic Development* (1958).

BERT F. HOSELITZ is Professor of Social Sciences at the University of Chicago and Director of the Research Center in Economic Development and Cultural Change. The author of *Sociological Aspects of Economic Development* (1960), he is working on social and political factors associated with India's economic development.

ITHIEL DE SOLA POOL is Professor of Political Science and Chairman of the Political Science Section as well as a member of the Center for International Studies at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He edited the recently published *Trends in Content Analysis* (1959).
