General Counsel for the ICC Court of Arbitration

The Court of Arbitration established by the International Chamber of Commerce (ICC) is the world's most widely used arbitration centre. Since the Court's foundation in 1923, parties in virtually every trading nation have submitted thousands of cases for settlement. Sums involved range from tens of thousands of dollars to more than one billion dollars. The Court's structure is designed to ensure that each case receives a truly international approach.

Extensive reforms are now being carried out by the Court to enable it to deal with growing numbers of increasingly complex cases while at the same time preserving its customary speed and effectiveness.

These changes involve the reorganisation of the Court's Secretariat. Under the authority of the Court's Presidency, a Director will assume responsibility for its administration and a General Counsel will assist the Court in forming its legal opinions.

The Director has already been appointed. The ICC is now seeking an experienced lawyer to fill the position of General Counsel. The General Counsel's chief responsibilities will be:

- to provide legal studies and opinions at the Court's request;
- to collate theoretical and practical information available in individual countries relating to commercial arbitration. The General Counsel will in particular act as Secretary to the ICC Commission on International Arbitration, participate in the work of the Institute of International Business Law and Practice founded by the ICC, and maintain liaison with the ICC's subsidiary arbitration centres throughout the world;
- to maintain contacts with other organizations concerned with commercial arbitration and with judicial and academic circles;
- to brief the Court on problems of international commercial arbitration and likely developments in this field and to make suggestions as appropriate.

Candidates must have thorough knowledge and experience of private international law and dispute settlement procedures. They must be able to write in the Court's official languages, English and French, and be free to travel.

The American Society of International Law

The American Society of International Law was organized in 1906 "to foster the study of international law and to promote the establishment and maintenance of international relations on the basis of law and justice."

The Society serves as a meeting place and forum for scholars, teachers, officials, lawyers, and others, from some one hundred countries. In April, it holds a three-day Annual Meeting at which current problems of international law are discussed. The Society also sponsors regional meetings outside of Washington in cooperation with other institutions. Salient questions of international law and relations are considered in depth by panels and study groups organized by the Society's Board of Review and Development. Works of scholarship are often published under the Society's auspices in connection with studies sponsored by the Board, many in the Society's series of *Studies in Transnational Legal Policy*.

The Society periodically issues four publications:

The American Journal of International Law, the leading journal in the field of international law, has been published since 1907. The *Proceedings of the American Society of International Law* carries the papers and discussion of the annual meeting of the Society.

International Legal Materials, a bimonthly, is a unique international collection of texts of current official documents, including legislation, treaties, court decisions, and reports. Subscription rates are \$24 a year for members of the Society, \$65 for others.

The quarterly *Newsletter* provides members with news of the Society and other organizations in the field.

Society membership is open to all persons of whatever nationality and profession who are interested in its objectives. Dues are: regular, \$55; special category, \$30 for persons *not* resident in a member country of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development; intermediate, \$25; student, \$10. Membership application form is printed at the back of each issue of AJIL.
