The author surveys the governmental systems, adapted from Western forms of government, ranging over countries almost wholly African in population, countries with larger settler communities (both European and Asian), and South Africa and Rhodesia, where European settlers retain political control. The 'Westminster model', the role of the military, the relationships between government and economic development, and the role of education in social change are discussed in the light of experience since independence of these countries. The final chapter is devoted to the relations of the African countries to each other and to the wider world.

Editorial policy avoids commitment to any political viewpoint or ideology, whether imperialism, pan-Africanism, capitalism, socialism, or nationalism. Such concepts, however, have relevance to the modern African situation, and merit serious discussion, often from several different points of view, in order that controversial issues may be fairly examined.
