Unlike most previous studies in modern East European history, this work seeks to give a systematic analysis of the causes of a major peasant revolt, stressing both long- and short-term factors. The author examines in detail Rumanian agrarian history between 1864 and the First World War. Wherever possible, the subject is discussed within a general European context, with emphasis on Eastern and Central Europe. An attempt is made to treat Rumanian history in regional as well as national terms; although there is much regional history in West European historiography, relatively little has appeared dealing with Eastern Europe. This book is the product of four years' research in Rumanian libraries and archives.
