PAPERS IN NORTHERN PLAINS PREHISTORY and ETHNOHISTORY: ICE GLIDER 320L110

This publication which is a superb blending of archeology and ethnohistory, provides a unique perspective of early Sioux Indian acculturation on the Upper Missouri River.

The monograph has two stated objectives: to report on archeological investigations conducted at three protohistoric village occupations in the Knife-Heart Region of North Dakota, and to place these data in the broader context of Western prehistory and ethnohistory.

The Arikara began moving into the upper Knife-Heart region by at least the mid-1790s and, although they moved in and out of the area several times, they finally returned in force to live in the abandoned Mandan village near Fort Clark between 1838 and 1861. One of the localities investigated, the Greenshield site, appears to have figured prominently in this invasion of what had been Hidatsa and Mandan territory.

The other two localities of research focused on the Ice Glider and Washburn Ferry sites, a habitation and cemetery area utilized by nomadic Plains Indians, probably the Yanktonal Dakota, in the mid-1800s. The field research provides a window into a heretofore poorly documented portion of the protohistoric Plains record as attested to by Raymond Wood:

"We know very little of nomadic peoples who may have been neighbors of the late prehistoric and early historic Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara. Ethnohistoric data and extrapolations from that data tell us that various Dakota bands were reaching the Missouri River in force in the late 1700s, but we have very little in the way of hard data concerning their archaeology. It is for this reason that the Ice Glider site is so important."

The section dealing with the cartographic history of the Upper Knife-Heart region by Wood and Stephen Chomko's ethnohistoric reconstruction make this a valuable source book for Plains historians as well as aficionados of Plains prehistory.

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
