Endangered Species

This is volume 1 in the series 'Issues For The Nineties' which addresses contemporary social issues. *Endangered Species* is a collection of articles from government reports, newspaper and magazine articles and literature from lobby and charity groups, examining the decline of animals and plants, and possible solutions to the problems. The editor encourages critical evaluation of the information and search for further information. Intended for educators and students.

Touching Horses: Communication, Health and Healing Through Shiatsu

Shiatsu is a system of healing and health maintenance by touch. The authors explain how and where to use finger pressure on the horse to stimulate the body's natural healing ability. Benefits include: early recognition and treatment of problems; stimulation of the nervous, circulatory and immune systems; and an improved level of relaxation and communication between patient and practitioner.

Wildlife Mammals as Research Models: In the Laboratory and Field

This is the proceedings of a half-day seminar held at the annual American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) conference in San Francisco. Papers include management of non-human primates and other species in the laboratory, studying reproduction in wildlife, methodological and ethical considerations of manipulating animals, ethics of keeping marine mammals in captivity, and the use of positive reinforcement techniques to enhance care and research.

Mammal Detective

Rob Strachan (1995). Whittet Books Ltd: London. 128pp. Paperback. Obtainable from the publishers, 18 Anley Road, London W14 0BY, UK (ISBN 1873580 207). Price £7.99.

A guide to detecting the presence of British wild mammals by their field signs: tracks, hair tufts, droppings, feeding remains, snuffle holes, eyeshine and frequencies of bat echolocation. Also included are trapping surveys of small mammal populations and radio tracking.

The Development of Brain and Behaviour in the Chicken

Lesley J Rogers (1995). CAB International: Wallingford. 273pp. Hardback. Obtainable from the publishers, Wallingford, Oxon OX10 8DE, UK (ISBN 0 85198 9241). Price £45.

A review of research on the development of the brain and behaviour in the chick. Comparisons are made to other avian species and also to mammalian species. The cognitive abilities of birds are discussed and related to animal welfare implications.

This book will interest workers in animal neurophysiology and behaviour, experimental psychologists and poultry scientists.

Equus caballus: On Horses and Handling

The author presents a new approach to the technique and problems of handling young horses and re-educating older ones, without the use of fear or aggression. Humans need to think like a horse to understand when a horse feels secure. Central to the method is the use of the 'war bridle'. For all horse-handlers.

Animal Welfare: A Cool Eye Towards Eden

This book aims to clarify the human role in caring for animals. Welfare can be assessed on scientific grounds by understanding the needs of animals.
