

Nationalities Papers Photo Contest

The annual photo contest rewards scholars for the best photos from their fieldwork. These photos are judged in terms of their content, synthesis, and visually compelling insights about nationalism, ethnicity, or migration. The photo submissions should be accompanied by a brief description (300-500 words) of how the photo relates to the fieldwork of the applicant in particular and nationalism, ethnicity or migration in general. This is the first year of the photo contest!

The contest is judged by a jury comprised of leading scholars from the editorial board of the journal. The membership of the jury changes every year, and is led by the editor-in-chief and supported by the managing editor. The 6 prize-winning photographs will be featured on the cover of *Nationalities Papers*. The photographer will be acknowledged in *Nationalities Papers*.

- May 9, 2020: The winners will be announced at the 25th Annual World Convention.

Nationalism and Populism in Semi-Peripheries: Central and Eastern European Responses to Global Challenges

Cluj-Napoca, Romania, 2–4 July 2020

Babeş-Bolyai University (UBB), in cooperation with the Association for the Study of Nationalities (ASN), is pleased to announce a joint conference, co-organized by the Faculty of Political Science and Public Administration and the Faculty of Sociology and Social Work of the Babeş-Bolyai University, together with the Romanian Institute for Research on National Minorities (ISPMN).

The conference's focus will be on the perception, representation, and reality of the semi-peripheral condition of Central and Eastern European countries, despite the optimism of the 1990s within the neoliberal post-communist order. Moreover, the European Union institutions and European democracies are increasingly being challenged by populist and nationalist sentiments, brought about partly by the corrosive social effects of economic neoliberalism and globalization. The conference also invites papers and panels devoted to broad questions of state-building and nationalism, ethnicity, borders, populations, national identity, and other related topics.

On the Cover. Following the Muslim conquest of Damascus in 634 AD, the Umayyad Mosque was built upon a basilica honoring St John the Baptist, which allegedly held the remains of his head. One of the oldest and largest mosques in the world, it is believed by Muslims to be the place where Jesus will return on the Day of Judgement. It is also the location of the mausoleum of Saladin, the Muslim leader who fought the Crusaders and retook control of Jerusalem.
