

direction of an *ad hoc* steering committee of southern African specialists from a number of American institutions. Professor Gwendolen M. Carter of Indiana University is the Chairman of the steering committee. Mr. Moore Crossey, the Africana librarian of Yale University, is the documentalist.

It should be noted that CAMP, which is closely affiliated with the SARAP project, has just completed microfilming several collections of southern African political documents: two reels of the late Chief Albert John Luthuli's papers, twelve reels of the private collection of Professor Immanuel Wallerstein, and sixty-two reels of documents belonging to Professors Gwendolen Carter and Thomas Karis. An index of the latter is now nearing completion. Scholars and students will have access to these collections and to others subsequently secured by CAMP, except for documents restricted by their donors for a period of time to avoid endangering anyone in southern Africa. CAMP also contains several other collections of documents from South Africa, Namibia and Zimbabwe, including parts of the archives of the National Union of South African Students (NUSAS), the South African Trade Union Council, Black Sash, the ICU and other bodies. It also holds transcripts of many of the South African and Namibian treason and sabotage trials. There are smaller amounts of material on all other countries, especially on Angola and Mozambique. These materials are available from CAMP under the usual conditions for borrowing or purchase. It is hoped soon to film a private collection of P.A.C. and S.A.S.O. publications, papers of the late A.W.G. Champion, and various liberation movement newsletters.

It will greatly aid the expansion of this material if persons and institutions possessing material will send Professor Carter or Mr. Crossey a brief statement on their holdings and also any relevant lists or catalogs of scarce or rare printed material and manuscripts that emanates from or concerns the area.

GRANTS & AWARDS

THE CENTER FOR FIELD RESEARCH was established to assist research investigators, whose projects can constructively utilize non-specialists in the field, arrange support. The Center is not the source of funds. Instead, it reviews and evaluates research proposals in a wide range of disciplines and assigns those accepted to other institutions which, in turn, sponsor the research. The funds are raised from carefully selected non-specialists who collectively finance the projects, in return for the opportunity to work as assistants to research scholars in the field. The Center considers proposals for field research in any recognized academic discipline and invites scholars of all nationalities to apply for support. The Center favors post-doctoral research, giving preference to projects whose staffs include graduate students of the discipline. Undergraduate research projects are not currently funded. The size of grants is limited by the number of non-specialists participating, since they are the source of
