



They should be typed in double spacing, footnotes being placed at the end of the article; preferably conform to the styling of The China Quarterly; and normally not exceed 8–10,000 words in length. A style sheet is available upon request. Submission of a manuscript is taken to imply that it has not previously been published and that it is not currently being considered elsewhere.

Now available for the first time, the U.S. State Department Central Files for China from 1950 through 1954 are the definitive source of diplomatic reporting on China's postwar reconstruction, the consolidation of power by the Communist Party, industrial and agricultural modernization, the impact of the Korean War, relations with the Soviets, and China's international position. Published in cooperation with the National Archives and Records Administration, and available only from UPA, the State Department Central Files on China from 1950 through 1954 illuminate this transitional era in extensive detail. No other collection matches the historical range, the in-depth analysis, and the exhaustive treatment of these files.

These records are indispensable for professors and students who are interested in China. It will be a boon to researchers to have access to the State Department's voluminous files in one convenient microfilm collection.
