Following the removal of the word "prominently" from AACR2 rule 21.1B2(d), a set of amendments has now been drawn up by the ARLIS Cataloguing and Classification Committee to accompany the guidelines to cataloguing exhibition literature - this key resource within art libraries.

A fully updated index and concordance of AACR2 rules has also been produced as part of the package.


