In addition to individual paper submissions, the journal also welcomes proposals for special symposia (3-5 articles) on specific regional or disciplinary themes. All symposia will undergo the same peer review process as other articles.

Electronic Submission. All submissions should be made online at the *Nationalities Papers* Manuscript Central site (<http://mc.manuscriptcentral.com/CNAP>). New users should first create an account. Once a user is logged onto the site submissions should be made via the Author Centre. Authors should prepare and upload two versions of their manuscript. One should be a complete text, while in the second all document information identifying the author should be removed from files to allow them to be sent anonymously to referees. When uploading files authors will then be able to define the non-anonymous version as "File not for review".

Note to authors. Please make sure your contact address information is clearly visible on the outside of all packages you are sending to Editors. Authors should be mindful of the need to identify and reference quoted material – text, tables, and figures – clearly and consistently, and to secure written permission from the copyright holder as appropriate. <http://tandf.tandf.co.uk/journals/ethics.asp>
