## Migration and mental health

The history of humanity is a story of migrants. Gradual migration was the progenitor of trade, innovations, war and epidemics. Recent rapid migration across vast cultural landscapes can bewilder both migrants and hosts. Migrants experience contrary emotions juxtapositioned: grief and renewal, loss and hope, separation and assimilation. The host feels invaded.
