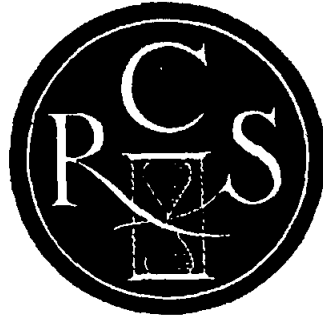
To save unnecessary delay and expense, contributors are asked to observe the following rules:

- (1) Articles should be typed, on A4 or 8 × 11, on one side only, and with double spacing. Notes, also in double spacing, should follow the text and be numbered consecutively throughout.
- (2) Where the original spelling of quotations is significant (as in bibliographical or literary articles) it should be retained, but with conventional contractions slightly expanded and with modern punctuation. Where the original spelling is not significant, it should be modernised.
- (3) Extended quotations from foreign languages should be given in translation, with the originals in the notes.
- (4) Titles of books and historical journals should be underlined for italics. Titles of articles should be enclosed in single inverted commas and not underlined. For the sake of clarity, arabic numerals should be used for all volume nos. of printed books, journals and MSS.
- (5) When a book, article or manuscript needs to be cited more than three times in an article, it should be given an abbreviation, and a list of such abbreviations should precede the notes.
- (6) Alterations in proof should be confined to corrections of printer's errors. The cost of other alterations is charged to the author.
- (7) Five offprints will be given free; additional copies will be charged to the author.
