

Tholfson tends to overrate Kay-Shuttleworth's role in decision-making. That Kay-Shuttleworth is not placed in the context of "the revolution in nineteenth-century government" also blurs this aspect of the analysis.

Tholfson's bibliography is up to date and almost complete. (He omits Nancy Ball, *Her Majesty's Inspectorate*, the best study of the school inspectors.) I think that he is a bit generous in his praise of some of the books he cites, however.

The book, then, is of interest to historians of politics, administration, and education. But we still await the definitive analysis of Kay-Shuttleworth's work and role.
