The **Orientation** in the U.S. Legal System introduces attorneys and law students from other countries to the American legal system. The program provides its participants with the necessary skills for understanding American law and the common-law system.

The core curriculum, which is taken by all students, includes Constitutional Law, Contracts, Torts, Civil

Procedure, Civil Rights and Civil Liberties, Corporations, and Commercial Law. Each student also chooses an elective concentration in either Legal Studies or International Business. The Orientation faculty includes prominent practitioners and academics from American law schools including

Georgetown, Harvard, Duke, New York University, and The George Washington University.

A two-week intensive course, *Introduction to Legal English,* is also offered immediately prior to the Orientation (June 28–July 9, 1999). This program provides a foundation in legal terminology and language usage, and develops the participants' ability to understand and use legal language in oral and written formats. The instruction combines a review of the standard terminology of the U.S. legal system with a study of sentence and paragraph structures that characterizes legal writing.



The Orientation will take place at **The George Washington University Law School**, Washington, D.C., the oldest law school in the nation's capital. Located within a few blocks of the White House and The World Bank, the Law School offers one of the finest

environments for legal training in the U.S. and international legal community. There is no better place than Washington to study the American legal system, as it is the center of the nation's judicial, legislative and executive branches. It is also one of the major cultural centers in the United States.

The International Law Institute was founded at Georgetown University in 1955. Now an independent organization, the Institute is engaged in a wide variety of training programs and other activities in support of the international legal community.
