Canadians Celebrate Golden Jubilee

The annual congress of the Canadian Political Science Association was slightly different this year. It was the 50th. Technically founded in 1913, the timing of the CPSA celebration took into consideration some years of abeyance.

In some respects, it was just another congress. Each year, the CPSA meets in conjunction with other Learned Societies at alternating university campuses. The extent of participation was similar to previous years. About 300 political scientists were listed formally as program participants and about 100 papers were presented.

But, this year the papers possessed a more cosmopolitan flavor and so did the participation. APSA President John Wahlke, University of Iowa, presented a paper on "Biology and Politics." *Political Studies* editor Jim Sharpe, Nuffield College, Oxford University, presented a paper on current research in Britain while Ali Dessouki, University of Cairo, reviewed the teaching of political science in Egypt. Martin

Seliger, Hebrew University, outgoing President of the Israel Political Science Association, presented a study of liberalism and socialism. The Indian Association was represented by B. P. Singh, Magadh University, while the International Association was represented by Secretary-General John Trent, University of Ottawa, and Past President Jean Laponce, University of British Columbia. Professor Laponce lectured on "Canadian Political Science and International Social Science" and delivered a paper on Montreal "as an element of national disintegration."

The highlight of the meeting was a special banquet for which keynote addresses were prepared by the eminences grises J. A. Corry, Queen's University, and J. C. Falardeau, Laval University. In an unexpected addition to the program, Jim Sharpe presented President Hugh Thorburn, Queen's University, with the President's tankard of the British Association, to which Professor Thorburn responded by toasting the queen.
