Lawyers in America have throughout this century opposed social change, only to have it thrust upon them. This study shows the profession as essentially elitist in nature, with its emphasis on serving business interests and its attempts to exclude minority groups. Professor Auerbach traces developments up to the 'law and order' reaction against the changes of the 1960s, and its culmination in Watergate which left public faith in the law shattered. £7.50
