- NORA WANG teaches contemporary Chinese history at the University of Nice.

- JAMES L. WATSON is lecturer in Asian Anthropology at the School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London.
- C. MARTIN WILBUR began his studies of China at Columbia University in 1931, became Curator of Chinese Archaeology and Ethnology at Field Museum in Chicago in 1936, and after a period of wartime service in Washington and China, became professor of Chinese history at Columbia University. He retired in 1976 as George Sansom Professor Emeritus and is now a Senior Research Associate in Columbia's East Asian Institute.
