A good length is 1200 words; however, longer articles will be considered. Photographs to accompany articles, where appropriate, are welcome but diagrams and tables should usually not be included. In general there should be no more than five references.

Conference briefings and reviews should be no more than 500 words.


Correspondence on subjects of topical interest is also welcome but letters should be no more than 500 words, with up to three references, and should not include diagrams or tables.

Please send three copies of all submissions, typed double-spaced, and using the Harvard system of referencing as in *The British Journal of Psychiatry*.

Contributions are accepted for publication on the condition that their substance has not been published or submitted for publication elsewhere. The views expressed in articles published in the *Psychiatric Bulletin* (except official College material) are the author's own and do not necessarily represent College policy.

The Psychiatric Bulletin operates an independent review system.

All material submitted for publication in the *Psychiatric Bulletin* should be accompanied by a covering letter to the editors signed by all authors.
