The 91st Annual Meeting of the American Political Science Association will be held in Chicago, IL, August 31-September 3, 1995. Over 600 panels will be held during the Meeting and will cover topics in all major subfields of political science. The Program theme is "Liberalism at Century's End: Competing Perspectives".

You must be a member of APSA to qualify for the member rates.
3. If your payment is for both preregistration and membership please indicate this on the form.
4. Preregistration payments are refundable only by written request postmarked by August 15, 1995. Under no circumstances will refund requests be honored after this date for preregistrants unable to attend the Annual Meeting.
