A MATTER OF HOPE: A Theologian's Reflections on the Thought of Karl Marx

Nicholas Lash

In taking the stance that "the pressure of apologetic concerns is as damaging to Marxist theory as it is to Christian theology," Lash asserts that neither Marxism nor Christianity has a blueprint for a future social order. To claim that human history after the death of Jesus — or the October Revolution — is "the administration of an achievement" is, for Lash, to counsel either optimism or despair.

Lash charts an alternative course between optimism and despair, based on a specifically religious — and Christian — understanding of *hope*. To hope is to resist claiming that "one knows the answer" to the question of the future, and to act on behalf of the redemptive liberation of humanity.

In addition to focusing on Marx's basic concepts through his most extensively debated writings (*The Paris Manuscripts*, *The German Ideology*, and the introduction to the *Gundrisse*), Lash's book engages other significant Marxian interpreters including Kolakowski, Thompson, Lukacs, Meszaros and Althusser. \$19.95 cloth
