

In submitting manuscripts, please send the ribbon original and three clear copies. Author's name should appear only on an unpaginated cover sheet, with address and essay's title. No other identifying reference to author should appear on the manuscript. All references to author's work in text or notes should be in the third person. Essay's title should appear at top of first page of text. Notes should be placed on separate sheets at end. Full double spacing should be used throughout, including indented quotations and notes. Top, bottom, and righthand margins should be at least one inch; left-hand margins at least one and-a-half. Manuscripts should be accompanied by an abstract of one hundred fifty words or less and an author vita of one hundred words or less. Manuscripts will be returned if postage is supplied.

Articles appearing in HORIZONS are abstracted and indexed in: The Catholic Periodical and Literature Index; Guide to Social Science and Religion in Periodical Literature; Index to Religious Periodical Literature; New Testament Abstracts; Religious and Theological Abstracts; and Social Science Citation Index. In our previous issue, the East-West, Buddhist-Christian focus jumped right off the page. No such thematic unity is apparent in this issue. Our authors address many different issues from several perspectives: theological, philosophical, psychological, and comparative. Susan Ross reflects on the body from feminist and sacramental angles; William Collinge guides us along John Dunne's unique journey; and Terrence Tilley analyzes "The Prudence of Religious Commitment". Spirituality is continued in Daniel Sheridan's consideration of "Maternal Affection for a Divine Son," and in Lucy Bregman's reflections on Imageries of Peace in charismatic Christianity and popular psychology.

We're used to provocative ideas from John Carmody, and I don't think he'll disappoint you in "Professing Religion in the Classroom."

"Provocative" is also probably the best word to characterize William Thompson's conversation with Leonard Swidler and John Hick on "Jesus' Unsurpassable Uniqueness." And the same goes, I think you'll agree, for our discussion of the Spirituality of Liberation. The exchange between Jon Sobrino and Paul Knitter, Keith Egan, and Elisabeth Koenig is anything but dull—as we'd expect of a discussion of political holiness. Maybe there is a theme emerging after all! If you need to warm up, there are reviews of fifty books.

Our new Associate Editor needs no introduction. Announcing the addition of Charles E. Curran to the editorial staff merely acknowledges the major contribution he has made to *Horizons* over a period of several years. To formalize that relationship is a great honor.
