THE YALE CENTER FOR PARLIAMENTARY HISTORY (YCPH), established in 1965 by Elizabeth R. Foster (Bryn Mawr C) and J. H. Hexter (Yale U), has announced it now has a complete catalogue of its holdings. Since its beginning, the Center has acquired through photographic reproduction the largest single collection of sixteenth- and seventeenth-century English parliamentary manuscript material in the world, consisting of microfilm and photocopies from the British Library, Public Record Office, Bodleian and Cambridge University libraries, and various small libraries and record offices throughout the British Isles. Also available for use, in conjunction with the Manuscripts and Archives Department of Yale University's Sterling Library, are films of selected State Papers from the late Elizabethan and early Stuart periods and virtually all of the calendars of the Elizabethan and Stuart patent rolls, including many patents for fishing rights and land grants in the New World.

The Center also has materials of interest to scholars of Elizabethan and Stuart intellectual and social history, including the files of the late Professor Wallace Notestein of Yale.

The Center has also announced the completion of editing of the first three volumes of *Commons Debates 1628*, which are scheduled to be published by Yale Press in the autumn. The final and index volumes are expected to follow closely.

The YCPH, located in 335A Sterling Library, is open five days a week from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. Scholars wishing to work there are asked to write in advance.

COMITATUS, a graduate student journal published annually under the auspices of the Center for Medieval Studies at UCLA, announces its forthcoming issue, Volume VI, which is to be a double issue, in 1976. The journal, which contains articles on medieval and Renaissance studies from a wide spectrum of fields, provides a unique opportunity for capable graduate students to publish in a professional journal. THE METROPOLITAN MUSEUM OF ART, New York, held an exhibition entitled 'Patterns of Collecting: Selected Acquisitions 1965–75,' December 6, 1975 – March 23, 1976. Organized and arranged by RSA member Olga Raggio (Metropolitan M), the exhibition aimed to show the differing approaches of private and institutional collectors. It also illuminated aspects of art by means of unexpected juxtapositions of material. Notable among newly exhibited items was the earliest Florentine-Renaissance bed in existence.
