

The Shaker Spiritual

DANIEL W. PATTERSON

Between 1780 and 1870 the American Shakers created an enormous body of new folk songs from elements of traditional ballad and dance tunes. Choosing 366 songs from the eight to ten thousand spirituals surviving in Shaker oral tradition and manuscripts, Daniel Patterson offers a delightful compendium that constitutes the largest and most balanced presentation yet made of the Shaker repertory. Transcending a strictly musicological approach, he explores the life history of this clearly bounded and well-documented song tradition. He shows how contrasting song types were shaped by Shaker beliefs and rituals, by the roles of brethren and sisters or the youth and the aged within the communities, and by changes in the membership, structure, and outlook of the Society.




