THE JOHN SIMON GUGGENHEIM MEMORIAL FOUNDATION has awarded fellowships for 1986 to the following RSA members for the projects noted: Judith C. THE GLADYS KRIEBLE DELMAS FOUNDATION has announced its 1987–1988 program of pre-doctoral and post-doctoral grants for research in Venice. The following areas of study will be considered: the history of Venice and the former Venetian empire in its various aspects—art, architecture, music, archaeology, theater, literature, natural science, political science, the law, economics; also studies related to the contemporary environment such as ecology, oceanography, urban planning and rehabilitation. Applicants should be United States citizens with some experience in advanced research. Graduate students must be at the dissertation stage. Grants will range from \$500 to \$10,000. Funds will also be available to assist in the publication of such studies resulting from these grants as are deemed worthy by the trustees and the advisory board. The Ph.D. (or equivalent) and publications are required. Qualified candidates of any nationality may apply for one or two terms. Some travel funds are available. COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY SOCIETY OF FELLOWS IN THE HUMANITIES. The Columbia Society of Fellows in the Humanities, with grants from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation and the William R. Kenan Trust, will appoint a number of postdoctoral fellows in the humanities for the academic year 1987–1988. The appointment carries the expectation of renewal for a second year. Fellows newly appointed for 1987–1988 must have received the Ph.D. between January 1, 1985 and July 1, 1987. The stipend will be \$26,000 one half for independent research and one half for teaching in the undergraduate program in general education. Additional funds are available to support research. Deadline for receipt of completed application forms is October 15, 1986. THE FOLGER SHAKESPEARE LIBRARY FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMS, 1987–1988. Short-term doctoral fellowships with stipends up to \$1,500 per month for a term of one to three months will be available during June 1987 to May 1988. A completed application requires three copies of the applicant's C.V., three copies of a 500-word description of the research project, plus three letters of recommendation submitted directly to the Fellowship Committee. The deadline for completed applications is March 1, 1987.

National Endowment for the Humanities Senior Fellowships and Folger Senior Fellowships: a limited number of these fellowships will be available to senior scholars who have made substantial contributions in their fields of research and who are pursuing research projects appropriate to the collections of the Folger. Fellowships are for six to nine months to be used between September 1987 and August 1988. They carry stipends of \$13,750 and \$20,625, respectively. Applicants should submit five copies of both a 500-word description and a C.V., including a list of publications, plus three letters of recommendation sent directly to the Fellowship Committee. The deadline for completed applications is November 1, 1986.

THE WOODROW WILSON INTERNATIONAL CENTER FOR SCHOLARS: RESIDENTIAL FELLOWSHIPS. The Center, in Wash-

ington, D. C., seeks from individuals throughout the world outstanding proposals representing diverse scholarly interests in the humanities and social sciences. Scholarship undertaken at the Center is not narrowly specialized and includes a strong humanistic component. The Center encourages proposals with theoretical, philosophical, or theological dimensions.

For academic participants, eligibility is limited to published scholars at the postdoctoral level; for participants from other backgrounds, equivalent maturity and professional achievement are expected. While in residence at the Center, Fellows devote their full time to writing and research on one major project. The length of a fellowship varies from four months to one year. Stipends are subject to a ceiling of \$35,000 per twelve-month period. Within this limit, stipends are keyed to the previous year's earned income for fellows in the United States, with similar arrangements for scholars from abroad who possess comparable experience and qualifications. Applicants are strongly urged to seek additional means of support, such as sabbatical leave. The deadline for applications is October 1, 1986, with decisions by mid-February 1987, and appointments to begin the following September. NATIONAL HUMANITIES CENTER FELLOWSHIPS 1987–88. The National Humanities Center, North Carolina, announces the availability of 35–40 fellowships. Most are for the academic year, but a few are available for the fall or spring semester. Senior scholars and younger scholars (several years past the doctorate) may apply. Scholars from any nation are eligible. In addition to fields normally associated with the humanities, applications are welcomed from representatives of the social sciences, the arts, the professions, and public life. While in residence at the Center and pursuing individual projects, scholars are invited to take part in the various activities offered: interdisciplinary seminars, lectures, conferences, etc. Stipends are based on the scholars' usual academic salaries and amounts vary according to the outside help given each scholar. All Fellows receive travel expenses to and from the Center for themselves and their families. Applications, postmarked by October 15, 1986, consist of a form (available from the Center), a curriculum vitae, a 1,000 word project proposal and three letters of recommendation.
