### Manuscripts

The China Quarterly welcomes the submission of manuscripts from scholars, including postgraduate students, on all aspects of contemporary China and from all points of view, including those which deal with Taiwan and Overseas Chinese. Articles on China prior to 1949 are also welcome, particularly, but not exclusively, when these relate directly to contemporary China or to the history of the Chinese Communist Party. Articles should be submitted in quadruplicate to the editorial office. They should normally not exceed 8,000 words in length; should be typed in double spacing, with footnotes at the end; and should conform to the styling of The China Quarterly (see below). An abstract of 100–150 words should also be provided for on-line promotional purposes. Submission of a manuscript is taken to imply that it has not previously been published in any form (including non-copyrighted working papers) and that it is not currently being considered elsewhere.

### Style

### Romanization and Chinese characters

*Pinyin* is used without tone/diacritical marks, except the following which should use the Wade-Giles system: names such as Chiang Kai-shek, Sun Yat-sen, Taipei and Kuomintang; names of individuals living outside mainland China. Chinese characters must be provided for all Chinese terms and proper nouns.

# THE GORDON WHITE PRIZE

The China Quarterly is pleased to announce the inauguration of this new academic prize in memory of Professor Gordon White. The prize will be awarded annually for the most original article or research note published in the journal in the relevant year. The value of the prize is £500.
