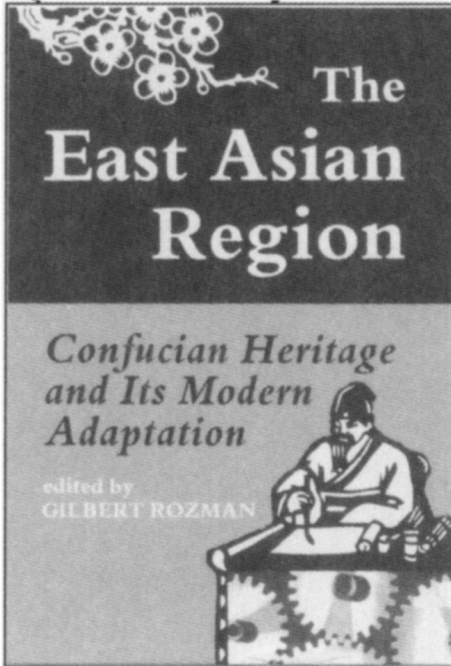

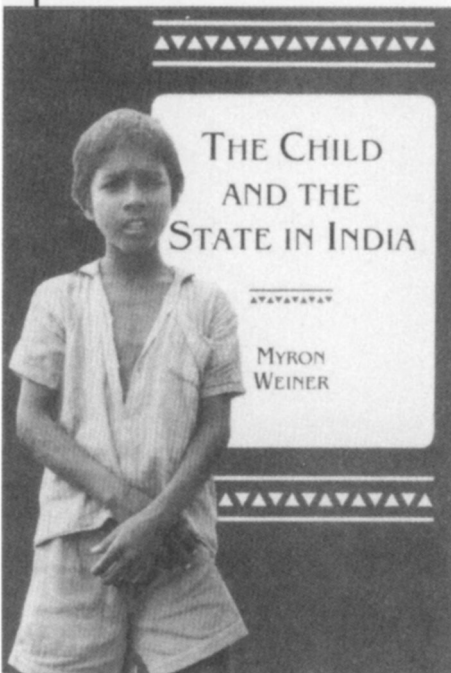
Confucian Heritage and Its Modern Adaptation

What is "Confucian" about East Asia? To answer this question, the contributors to this volume range over 2,000 years of history. The introduction by Gilbert Rozman discusses the special character of East Asia. Part I analyzes the Confucianization of China, Korea, and Japan in premodern times, asking what was essential to Confucianism in each of these three countries and when Confucian values spread to successive groups in their populations. Part II carries the discussion forward by examining the elements that have survived from this tradition.

While pinpointing national variations, the book takes a regional approach to East Asia in comparative and historical perspective and is the first work to assess in one volume the significance of Confucianism for China, Japan, and Korea.

Child Labor and Education Policy in Comparative Perspective

Myron Weiner

India has the largest number of non-schoolgoing working children in the world. Why has the government not removed them from the labor force and required that they attend school, as have the governments of all developed and many developing countries? To answer this question, this major comparative study first looks at why and when other states have intervened to protect children against parents and employers. After examining Europe of the nineteenth century, the United States, Japan, and a number of developing countries, Myron Weiner shows how cultural, not just economic, conditions account for India's unique situation.

The annual institutional subscription rate for the *Journal* (including the *Bibliography of Asian Studies* and the *Doctoral Dissertations on Asia*) is \$80, postage included. Regular members of the Association for Asian Studies receive the *Journal* as part of their annual membership. Single issues of the *Journal* and *Bibliography* published after February 1974 are available through the Secretariat of the Association. Issues published prior to 1958 may be purchased from A.M.S. Reprints, 56 East 13th Street, New York, NY 10003.

The editor welcomes preliminary inquiries about manuscripts for possible publication in *The Journal of Asian Studies*. Completed manuscripts should be sent to the editor, David D. Buck, *JAS*, Department of History, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Milwaukee, WI 53201. Please submit four copies. All submitted work should be double-spaced, including extracts, notes, and references. Because manuscripts cannot be returned, please do not send the original. Consult recent issues of the *Journal* as a guide to the format for source citations, notes, and references. Footnotes should be as few as possible and typed double-spaced at the end of the text. Documentation should follow the style recommended in sections 15.4 through 15.35 of *The Chicago Manual of Style*, 13th ed. (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 1982), pp. 400–408. All manuscripts submitted to the *JAS* are expected not to have been published elsewhere and not to be under review for possible publication elsewhere. Manuscripts, including notes, should not be more than 40 pages in length.

Authors are encouraged to submit tables, figures, and black-and-white photographs, and other illustrations along with their manuscripts. Photocopies or photos of record are acceptable for first review and should accompany the manuscript at original submission. Authors who wish to illustrate their articles with photographs must provide black-and-white glossy prints of good quality at the time of final delivery of their copyedited manuscript. Please provide a separate, typewritten, double-spaced list of captions and legends for all illustrations, keyed by number to each figure or photograph, including all necessary credit or permission lines. Authors are responsible for securing and paying for permission to use illustrative material. Do not write on the back of photographs or paste photographs to sheets of paper. Identify each photo by typing the first words of its caption on a stick-on label, then affix the label to the back of the photo. Photographs will be returned after publication.
