Dr. George E. Outland, fourth from the left, a political scientist who taught at Santa Barbara State, now the University of California, Santa Barbara, and San Francisco State and served in the U.S. House of Representatives from California from 1943 to 1947. In the above photograph he is shown at the White House signing of the Full Employment Act of 1946. The photograph included the following members of Congress from left to right: Senator Joseph C. O'Mahoney of Wyoming; Representative Wright Patman of Texas; Senator William Whittington, Mississippi; Senator Charles Tobey of New Hampshire; Senator George Radcliffe of Maryland; Representative George Bender of Ohio; and Senator Abe Murdock of Utah. At the center of the photograph is President Harry Truman.

As noted by Representative Outland's son, Dr. John W. Outland of the Department of Political Science of the University of Richmond, the Full Employment Act of 1946, in which his father played an active role, is especially well known to political scientists through Stephen Bailey's famous book, *Congress Makes a Law*.

Project 87

Project 87, the joint American Political Science Association/American Historical Association Project to study the United States Constitution, reports three activities: a conference, "The American Constitutional System Under Strong and Weak Parties"; a meeting of the Project 87 Advisory Board, and announcement of grant and fellowship awards from the second competition.

The conference on "The American Constitutional System Under Strong and Weak Parties" was held in Williamsburg, Virginia on April 27 and 28. It was chaired by Project 87 Joint Committee members Austin Ranney, American Enterprise Institute; Professor Patricia Bonomi, New York University; and Professor James MacGregor Burns, Williams College.

Four prominent constitutional scholars presented papers focusing on four selected periods of American political history when political parties were thought to be especially strong or especially weak:
