which was presented at the meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, December 29, 1960, in New York City.

Illustrated articles will cover the following areas: United States, Canada, China, Egypt, Great Britain and Mexico. Special subjects treated include: river basin salvage, highway construction salvage, techniques and tools of archaeological salvage, and the contribution of physics to archaeological conservation. This symposium constitutes the first comprehensive international survey of the pressing, world-wide problem of archaeological salvage.

THE HELLENIC SOCIETY

The Society for the Promotion of Hellenic Studies was founded in 1879 to advance the study of Greek language, literature, history and art. It maintains in London, jointly with the Roman Society and in association with the Institute of Classical Studies of the University of London, a library of some 30,000 volumes, and a large collection of lantern slides. Both books and slides can be sent to members by post. Meetings with lectures are held in London four times a year and in various parts of the country in collaboration with local associations. The *Journal of Hellenic Studies* is recognised as one of the foremost British periodicals in the field of classical scholarship. It contains articles on a wide range of subjects, illustrations and book reviews.

THE BRITISH SCHOOL AT ATHENS

The School was founded in 1886 to provide British students of the language, literature, history, religion, archaeology or art of Greece in ancient, mediaeval or modern times with facilities for research and travel in Greece itself. It maintains in Athens a Hostel for students and a large library covering every aspect of Greek studies, ancient and modern: and in Crete a Dig-house at Knossos which serves as a base for excavations and for students engaged in research.

The School has sponsored or undertaken many excavations in Greek lands. The most important since the war have been conducted at Knossos, Mycenae, Old Smyrna and on Chios. The results of these excavations are published in the *Annual of the British School at Athens*, and full preliminary reports on them appear in the *Archaeological Reports*. Both the *Annual* and the *Reports* are sent free to subscribers of £2 per annum.

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
