Joint International Conference of the Hegel Society of Great Britain and the Hegel Society of America : Oxford, 1981

To commemorate the 150th anniversary of Hegel's death, the HSGB and the HSA have decided to organize a joint conference open to participants from all countries. It will be held in Merton College, Oxford from the afternoon of 1 September to the afternoon of 4 September 1981 (i.e. three full days). Accommodation in the College can be provided for all participants. The general theme of the conference will be 'Hegel's Philosophy of Action: Individual, Culture and Society'. Eight main papers are envisaged. In addition it is hoped to organize within the conference a 'workshop' on a select problem in Hegel's political philosophy with at least four additional meetings.

The planning of the conference is in the hands of a committee consisting of the following HSGB and HSA members: Prof. W.H. Walsh (Merton College, Oxford), Chairman, Dr. D. Lamb (Manchester University), Secretary, Prof. E.E. Harris (Ambleside, Cumbria), Prof. H.S. Harris (Glendon College, York University, Toronto), Prof. Q. Lauer, S.J. (Fordham University), Dr. Z.A. Pelczynski (Pembroke College, Oxford), Prof. R. Plant (Southampton University), Prof. L. Pompa (Birmingham University), Prof. C. Taylor (All Souls College, Oxford).
