THE CONTRIBUTORS

DAVID P. MOZINGO is a specialist on Chinese Communist affairs in the Social Science Department of The RAND Corporation, Santa Monica, California.

JOHAN GALTUNG, Director of the International Peace Research Institute, Oslo, Norway, has written *Gandhis politiske etikk* (1955, with Arne Næss), *Fengselssamfunnet* (1959), and *Theory and Methods of Social Research* (1967), as well as two forthcoming works, *Theories of Conflict* and *Theories of Peace*.

EDWARD A. KOLODZIEJ is Associate Professor of Government, University of Virginia, and the author of *The Uncommon Defense and Congress, 1945-1963* (1966). His article in this issue grew out of a Rockefeller Fellowship in Paris in the winter of 1965-1966.

PAUL Y. HAMMOND, a member of the research staff of the Social Science Department of The RAND Corporation, is the author of *Organizing for Defense* (1961), coauthor of *Strategy, Politics, and Defense Budgets* (1962) and *The United States in a Disarmed World* (1966), and a contributor to *American Civil-Military Decisions* (1963). He is currently studying problems of control and influence for American foreign policy in U.S. foreign operations.

KLAUS KNORR, Professor of Public and International Affairs and Director of the Center of International Studies at Princeton University, is an editor of *World Politics* and the author of *On the Uses of Military Power in the Nuclear Age* (1966) and other books.

CLAUDE AKE, a Nigerian, teaches political theory at Columbia University, New York. He has contributed articles to a number of journals, including *The Review of Politics*, *Comparative Studies in Society and History*, and *The Western Political Quarterly*, and he is completing a book on the theory of political integration.

ANN RUTH WILLNER is a Research Associate at Princeton's Center of International Studies, which issued her latest publication, *The Neotraditional Accommodation to Political Independence* (1966). She has recently finished the first of two studies of political leadership, *Strategies of Charismatic Leadership*. Her experience in Indonesia has included serving as an adviser with Indonesia's Ministry of Foreign Affairs and National Planning Bureau and conducting research on social change in rural areas.

LEONARD BINDER is Professor of Political Science and Chairman of the Department at the University of Chicago. His most recent books are *Politics in Lebanon* (1966), which he edited, and *The Ideological Revolution in the Middle East* (1964).
