

NOTES ON THE CONTRIBUTORS

PEGGY A. LOVELL is Assistant Professor of Sociology and Latin American Studies at the University of Pittsburgh. She is completing a book on racial inequality and development in Brazil.

LEON ZAMOSC is Associate Professor of Sociology at the University of California, San Diego. He wrote *The Agrarian Question and the Peasant Movement in Colombia* as well as articles on social development, agrarian political economy, and peasant movements.

Professor of Political Science and Latin American Studies at Tulane University, **RODERIC AI CAMP** is a contributing editor to the Library of Congress's Handbook of Latin American Studies and to the World Book Encyclopedia. The winner of a Howard Heinz Foundation Fellowship for research on the Mexican Catholic Church for 1990–1991, he has published numerous articles and books on Mexico, the most recent being *Politics in Mexico*.

DAVID BLOCK is Ibero-American Bibliographer at Cornell University Library. His book, *Mission Culture on the Upper Amazon: Native Tradition, Jesuit Enterprise, and Secular Policy in Moxos, 1660–1880*, was published this spring.

A Peruvian from the northeastern Andes, **EDMUNDO MORALES** teaches sociology at West Chester State University in Pennsylvania. The author of *Cocaine: White Gold Rush in Peru*, he is currently writing an ethnographic-photographic book on the various social uses of the guinea pig in the Andes.

TODD LITTLE-SIEBOLD recently completed his doctorate at Tulane University and is currently finishing a comparative regional history of Guatemala in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. He is also preparing several guides and research tools on archives and collections in Guatemala.

MANUEL PASTOR, JR., is Associate Professor of Economics and Research Fellow at the International and Public Affairs Center at Occidental College in Los Angeles. He has published widely on debt and stabilization issues and is currently working on the political economy of trade liberalization in Latin America.

CHARLES D. BROCKETT is Professor of Political Science at the University of the South. He is currently preparing a new edition of *Land, Power, and Poverty: Agrarian Transformation and Political Conflict in Central America* as well as continuing a project on social movements in Central America.

MARK PECENY, Assistant Professor of Political Science at the University of New Mexico, is presently working on a book manuscript on the promotion of democracy in U.S. policy during military interventions.

O. NIGEL BOLLAND, Professor of Sociology at Colgate University, taught previously at the University of the West Indies. The author of three books on Belize and many articles on the Caribbean, he is writing a book on the labor movement in the British Caribbean between 1934 and 1954.

AVI CHOMSKY, Assistant Professor of History at Bates College, recently completed a book entitled "A Perfect Slavery": West Indian Workers and the United Fruit Company in Costa Rica, 1870–1950 (forthcoming from Louisiana State University Press). She is currently researching the social impact of U.S. sugar companies in Oriente, Cuba, from 1898 to 1959.

The dissertation fieldwork of **LES W. FIELD**, which focused on revolutionary social change among Nicaraguan artisans, forms the basis for his forthcoming book entitled *War, Revolution, and Afterward: The Changing Identities of Artisan Communities in Western Nicaragua*. He has also written about his research among indigenous peoples in Colombia, Ecuador, and California.

Associate Professor of Geography and Anthropology at Louisiana State University, **JILL BRODY** is an anthropological linguist and editor of the *Journal of Mayan Linguistics*. She works on the conversation and discourse of Tojolab'al Mayan, which is spoken in Chiapas, Mexico.

AARON SEGAL, Professor of Political Science at the University of Texas at El Paso, is the author of *An Atlas of International Migration* (published by Bowker in 1993) and seven other books.

J. CORDELL ROBINSON is Professor of Latin American History at California State University, San Bernardino. The author of *El movimiento gaitanista en Colombia*, he is currently researching various aspects of the history of Colombian international relations.
