Announcing 2009 CGCEH Research Grants for Pre-Dissertation, Dissertation, and Postdoctoral Travel for Central European History

Deadline March 16, 2009

The Conference Group for Central European History (CGCEH) invites applications from North American doctoral candidates (ABD) and recent PhDs in Central European history for travel and research grants. CGCEH will award up to five grants at \$6,000 each. Funds are intended to support dissertation research and follow-up, and may be used on travel between May 1 and December 31, 2009.

Applicants should be affiliated, or recently affiliated, with an accredited North American institution of higher education and a member of the Conference Group of Central European History at or near the time of application. Membership in CGCEH is automatic with an individual subscription to the journal *Central European History* (\$25 annually for graduate students and \$40 for others). Application Procedure

The following materials are required:

- CGCEH application form (attached, or available at the CGCEH Web site, <http://cssaame.com/cgceh/>);
- *Curriculum Vitae*;
- Statement of purpose (1-3 single-spaced pages), including a concise project description, proposed time period of research, specific cities and institutions to be visited, and activities anticipated;
 - Two letters of recommendation, preferably including one from the academic advisor of the project;
- Budget worksheet

A written project report will be required at the conclusion of the grant.

Editorial Policy

Central European History publishes articles, review articles, book reviews, and conference reports dealing with the history of German-speaking Central Europe. The journal solicits manuscripts using all approaches to history and dealing with all historical periods. Because space is limited, articles which have been or soon will be published elsewhere are not accepted. Manuscripts submitted to CEH should not be under consideration by another journal pending decision of the editor on publication. If it is learned that an article is under submission to another journal while being considered at CEH, consideration will cease immediately. Unsolicited book reviews are not accepted.

Manuscripts and correspondence should be directed to:

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The editors prefer that manuscripts be submitted in electronic form as e-mail attachments sent to the journal's address, preferably in Microsoft Word 2003 or later or WordPerfect 12.0 or later; Adobe Acrobat pdf files will also be reviewed. Manuscripts submitted in printed form must be accompanied by a compact disk or diskette with the article in Word, WordPerfect, or pdf. The entire text of all manuscripts, including footnotes and headings, must be prepared in double-spaced typescript with generous margins to allow for copyediting. Footnotes must be numbered consecutively and should be placed in a separate section at the end of the text.

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Further guidelines for the preparation of manuscripts for publication in *Central European History* will be sent upon acceptance of materials by the editor. All materials will be edited to conform with *The Chicago Manual of Style* in matters regarding punctuation, capitalization, and format. The final decision on style remains with the editor.

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
