THE CONTRIBUTORS

TAYA ZINKIN is a resident of Bombay and correspondent to the *London Economist*, the *Manchester Guardian*, the *New Commonwealth*, and the *Wall Street Journal*.

ALEXANDER L. GEORGE is a political scientist and has been a member of the Social Science Division of the RAND Corporation since 1948.

ASHER LEE served with the Royal Air Force in World War II and attended the Cairo Conference as senior British Air Intelligence delegate. He is the author of *The German Air Force* (1946), *The Soviet Air Force* (1950), and *Air Power*, to be published early this year.

ALEXANDER ECKSTEIN, Research Associate at the Russian Research Center, Harvard University, was formerly an economist in the Division of Research for the Far East in the State Department. Co-author, with W. W. Rostow, of the recently published *Prospects for Communist China* (1954), he is preparing a monograph on the national product of mainland China.

HANS J. MORGENTHAU is Professor of Political Science and Director of the Center for the Study of American Foreign Policy at the University of Chicago. Among his recent publications are *Scientific Man vs. Power Politics* (1946), *In Defense of the National Interest* (1951), and *Politics Among Nations* (1948; 2nd revised ed., 1954).

PHILIP RIEFF is Assistant Professor of Sociology at Brandeis University and taught previously at the University of Chicago. His book, *The Social Thought of Sigmund Freud*, will be published shortly by Oxford University Press.

BERT F. HOSELITZ is Professor of Social Science and Director of Studies of the Committee on International Relations at the University of Chicago. The editor of *The Progress of Underdeveloped Countries* (1952), he is working on a study of *Social Structure and Economic Growth*, to be published later this year.

JAMES L. McCAMY, Professor of Political Science at the University of Wisconsin, specializes in public administration and the conduct of foreign relations. His book, *The Administration of American Foreign Affairs* (1950), won the Freedom House-Wendell Willkie award as the best publication of the year in the field of international relations.

DAVID S. LANDES, Assistant Professor of Economics at Columbia University, is the author of *Bankers and Pashas: A Study of International Finance and Economic Imperialism in the Egypt of the 1860's*, in course of publication.

GERHART NIEMEYER is serving as Visiting Lecturer on International Relations at Yale University and Consultant to the Council on Foreign Relations in New York. He is engaged in writing, with James N. Murray, Jr., a treatise on general policy problems of international organization.
