The prize is in the amount of \$1,000.00 to be paid to the author of the best book originating in the North American scholarly community, and presenting original research or interpretation in the history of Christianity or any period thereof.

Books considered for this award must be published during the years 1983 or 1984. Any member of the Society may nominate titles for consideration for the Schaff Prize. Copies of books do not have to be submitted. Titles nominated for consideration of the award must be received by the Chairperson of the Committee on Research of the Society or William B. Miller, Secretary, American Society of Church History, 305 East Country Club Lane, Wallingford, PA 19086, by 1 March 1985. The announcement of the winner of the Schaff Prize will be made at the annual meeting of the Society in December 1985.

# **BREWER PRIZE CONTEST**

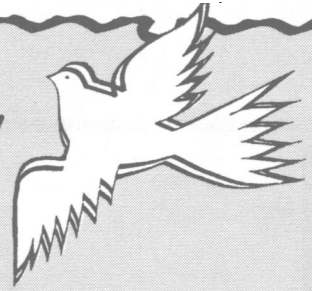
