## **ASSOCIATE PROFESSORS or ASSISTANT PROFESSORS**

in the following specializations:

### **Terrorism and Internal Conflict**

Applicants are expected to be scholars whose research focus on the analysis of political violence, terrorism and internal conflict. The successful candidate is also expected to be able to manage a team of research analysts, provide research direction, conduct threat analysis, as well as publish and vet papers on political violence, terrorism and internal conflict.

### **International Political Economy**

Applicants are expected to have a research interest in the economic aspects of regionalism in East and Southeast Asia who could join the school's Multilateralism and Regionalism Programme and/or International Political Economy Programme. He or she should also have an interest in Finance and be able to teach an introductory quantitative methods course in the School's Master of Science Programme.

### **US Foreign Policy**

Applicants should possess a good understanding of the foreign, military and broad security policies of the United States. The successful candidate is expected to conduct and publish research on foreign and security policies/strategies of the United States, especially towards Asia, teach graduate level courses in these areas, and interact with policy-makers in subjects related to United States diplomacy, security strategy and history.

Successful applicants will teach up to two courses in the School's Master of Science Programmes. A relevant PhD and a good publication record are therefore essential requirements. Applicants are also expected to contribute to the School's research agenda, contribute to team research and policy-oriented projects, teach in short executive programmes, and organize conferences and seminars. Experience in policy-relevant research and publication would be useful.

Initial appointments are for three years, which are renewable, subject to mutual agreement. Those with the appropriate qualifications and experience may be appointed at the Associate Professor level.

All applicants should submit the following:

- A detailed curriculum vitae
- 2 published articles or writing samples
- A cover letter specifying how your qualifications match the job description
- 3 reference letters

# Notes for contributors

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The Editors welcome submission of articles for consideration. The length required for articles is normally 9–12,000 words, articles over 12,000 words will only be considered if there is a clear rationale for the extra length. Review articles should be about 4,000 words and replies about 2,000 words. These are also sent to independent referees. The *Review* is a refereed journal, and contributors should allow time for the process of refereeing to take place. **It is the author's responsibility to provide the editors with an accurate total word count for all articles on submission.**

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An abstract of 100 words plus a short biographical note (appropriate for Notes on Contributors) should accompany the manuscript. To guarantee anonymity, authors should include a title page without their names, and remove any reference to themselves from the manuscript.

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## References and notes

These should be amalgamated and signalled serially within each article by superscript numerals. References and notes should be at the foot of each page. References should give full biographical details, including place of publication **and** publisher, at first mention. Thereafter the author's surname and a short title should be used (not *op. cit.*). A cross-reference to the original citation, e.g. '(see n.4 above)', may also be added if the short title reference is not immediately clear. The title of an article should appear in single inverted commas; the title of a book or journal should be underlined. Main words should be 'first-letter' capitalised in article and book titles.

References and notes should be typed in the form of the following examples:
