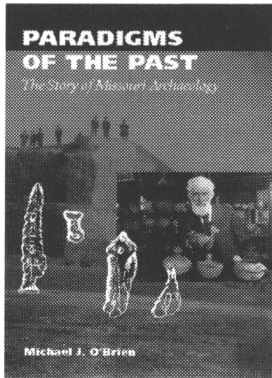

## PARADIGMS OF THE PAST

Michael J. O'Brien

O'Brien presents the history of archaeology in Missouri and uses it as a vehicle to examine the development of Americanist archaeology in general. By demonstrating how amateurs and trained archaeologists have examined artifacts and sites and how their views of the past have changed over the last 150 years, O'Brien offers an insightful interpretation of the archaeologist's role in shaping archaeology. In addition, O'Brien contrasts interpretation of the archaeological record with explanation of it, contending that no issue in archaeology is more important than understanding this distinction.
