BLISS CARTWRIGHT is Assistant Professor of Sociology at the State University of New York at Buffalo. He is currently working on a study of the flow of business in state supreme courts from 1870 to 1970.

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ROBERT KIDDER completed his doctoral training at Northwestern University in 1971 after having taught for two years in South India and after conducting dissertation research there for a third year. He is currently Assistant Professor of Sociology at Temple University, teaching several courses in the Sociology of Law, and continuing his research on litigation and lawyers in South India. He is the representative of Legal Sociology on the Committee on Asian Law of the Association for Asian Studies and has been collaborating on a report on American research on Asian Law sponsored by the International Legal Center and the Committee on Asian Law.

CHARLES MORRISON, Associate Professor of Anthropology at Michigan State University, obtained his Ph.D. in Social Anthropology at the University of Chicago in 1965. He taught in the Department of Anthropology at the University of Rochester from 1965 until 1972. In 1963-64 and again in 1968-69, he undertook research in North India. His doctoral research was on the development of statutory village councils in a Haryana village. He returned to the region four years later to make a study of the social organization of a local élite category, the membership of the Indian district legal profession. He also undertook research on urban social life in a small provincial town. His scholarly articles and reviews have appeared in *The Journal of Asian Studies*, *Comparative Studies in Society and History*, *Law & Society Review*, *The Journal of the Indian Anthropological Society*, *Studies in Third World Societies*, and various symposia volumes.
