NOTES FOR CONTRIBUTORS

In future the *Scottish Journal of Theology* will be published from electronically prepared manuscripts which are produced by the authors themselves or are keyed in Edinburgh. MSS should be prepared with IBM compatible software.

Submission of an article is taken to imply that it has not previously been published in English, and is not being considered by another journal for publication in English. In the interests of authors, copyright is normally assigned to the Scottish Academic Press. The average length of articles is 5,000 words; those in excess of 10,000 words cannot be considered.

While notification of acceptance or rejection will be given, rejected contributions (hard copy or disk) will not be returned. It is assumed that authors retain in their possession the original copies of all articles or reviews submitted.

In the first instance **three** copies of each manuscript should be submitted in printed form, preferably with the floppy disk, to the Editorial Secretary, at Scottish Academic Press, 33 Montgomery Street, Edinburgh EH7 5JX. If it is accepted, editorial suggestions (if any) will be sent to the author for electronic incorporation in the manuscript, when the revised disk and text copy should be sent to the Editorial Secretary for printing. It is assumed again that the author will retain a copy of the revised disk and manuscript in his possession.

All contributions (articles and reviews) should be submitted in double spacing, with endnotes, which should be used sparingly, in single spacing. Cross-references within the article should not be included.

Notes for editors and instructions for the printer should be submitted along with the manuscripts on separate sheets. First proofs of articles (but not of reviews) will be sent back to the authors for correcting, and must be returned within ten days of receipt. Correction should be confined to typographical errors. Other corrections can be made only with the concurrence of an editor.

Contributions from the United States may use U.S. spellings. Greek and Hebrew words need not be transliterated if an internationally used system has been used, e.g. Multi-Lingual Scholar, Ibycus, Nota Bene, or Vuwriter. Capitalisation should be kept to a minimum; and in particular should not be used in pronouns referring to God. The Editors have the right to make minor alterations in the text in accordance with their established editorial practice.

Contributors of articles and article reviews (but not of reviews) receive 10 offprints without cost. Extra copies may be ordered according to a set scale of charges, provided that they are requested at the time when corrected proofs are returned.
