This exhibition catalogue has a Foreword by Ann Compton and four essays: 'A Family Perspective' by Michael Pugh Thomas; 'From Signwriter to Cathedral Sculptor' by Joseph Sharples; 'The Artist as Medallist' by Keith Sugden and Phyllis Stoddart; and 'Private Pleasures' by Cecilia Crighton. The text is complemented by 59 black and white illustrations.

The Liverpool Academy and Other Exhibitions of Contemporary Art in Liverpool 1774–1867

A History and Index of Artists and Works Exhibited EDWARD MORRIS and EMMA ROBERTS

Liverpool was the first English provincial city in the eighteenth century to hold art exhibitions. Its midnineteenth century exhibitions were notable for attracting Pre-Raphaelite and foreign artists who had difficulty in showing their works in London. Their development and eventual collapse reveal the importance of municipal enterprise and official subsidy, of the free market and cash flow, of artistic feuds and the battle of styles in the growth of provincial culture.
