## Rebels and Revolutionaries in North China, 1845–1945

*Elizabeth J. Perry.* Why do peasants rebel? In particular, why do some peasants rebel and not others? Starting from the fact that only in certain geographical areas does rebellion seem to recur persistently, the author examines three notable rebel movements in the region of Huai-pei: the Nien rebels of the 1850's and 1860's, the Red Spear Society of the Republican era, and the Communist movement of the 1930's and 1940's. The author also throws new light on the role of secret societies in peasant protest, and offers a fresh interpretation of the relationship between rebellion and revolution. \$25.00

## The Poetic Memoirs of Lady Daibu

*Translated, with an Introduction, by Phillip Tudor Harries.* This is the first English translation of an evocative blend of poetry, prose, and autobiography covering almost 50 years in the life of a Japanese noblewoman.
